


OFFICE AN PUBLICATION OF METASSA LODGE - ORDER OF THE ARROW WINTER 162


LODGE LOSES OUTSTANDING MEMBERS

The project is the erecting of permanent rainproof shelters in all of the campsites.
These shelters will provide our

with a dry spot to gather on
those rainy summer days.

The first phase was the cutting of poles to be used in building these shelters. Approximately 100 of these poles were cut and stored during our work day on Nov. 18.
